

Mission: to advance education and choice for women and girls in the Sahel


Vision: A Sahel where all girls are educated and free from early marriage, where all women are free to choose the timing and number of their children, and where everyone has enough to eat.

DEFINING THE SAHEL




Temperature change in Sahel study region





"Increasing the age at marriage by five years could directly reduce 15 to 20 percent of future population growth."





Among girls in our safe space program, secondary school completion rates increased from 4 to 82%; age of marriage increased from 14.9 to 17.4
