

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Actual vs. desired number of children for adults under 50



Factors that majorly impact people's fertility



- When asked which factors had a major impact on their ability or decision to have children, the top factors for adults under 50 were concern over the state of the world (35%) and not being able to afford [more] kids (34%).
- For women under 50 and for Gen Z men and women, mental health (33% and 34%, respectively) and being worried about how laws that restrict abortion and reproductive health care will affect them/their partner during pregnancy also have a major impact (30% for both groups).

Concerns about national and world population growth



- 50% said they are very to somewhat concerned about global population growth, while 22% are a little concerned and 24% are not concerned at all.
- 45% said they are very to somewhat concerned about national population growth, while 22% are a little concerned and 29% are not concerned at all.
- Across subgroups, the most concerning impacts of population growth are more children who live in poverty (36% chose this as a top concern) and the depletion of resources, such as fresh water, forests, and food (30% chose this as a top concern).

Level of agreement with selected statements

- Overpopulation and climate change make us uneasy about raising children on a planet that is already in trouble.
 - 25% strongly agree
 - 30% somewhat agree
 - 16% somewhat disagree
 - 24% strongly disagree
 - 4% don't know



Level of agreement with selected statements

- Overpopulation and climate change make us uneasy about creating another human who will contribute to the destruction of the planet.
 - 17% strongly agree
 - 25% somewhat agree
 - 18% somewhat disagree
 - 35% strongly disagree
 - 5% don't know





What do you think is the current national population, or total number of people in the United States? Please provide your best guess as a number.








Knowledge of world population

• Yes: 31%


Have you seen any headlines about global population growth in the past month?

• Yes: 11%




Nearly 40% of Americans don't know that our national population is growing






Nearly 30% of Americans don't know that our global population is growing






Only a third are very to somewhat concerned about global population growth






Just a quarter are very to somewhat concerned about declining birth rates






Changing family values is the top concern related to low birthrates

What does this tell us?

- The general public is ill-informed about population sizes and trends, which is likely being exacerbated by the barrage of media stories about declining fertility rates.
- Not many are concerned. However, pop. growth concern is still higher than concern over declining birthrates.
- 3) Conservatives are more concerned about declining birth rates and changing family norms, while liberals are more concerned about global population growth and its environmental impacts.
- 4) There is clearly a need for organizations like Population Connection to continue to push back against "baby bust" misinformation, and to raise awareness of population trends and impacts.
