

GUATEMALA'S HEALTH DISPARITIES


- Maternal health outcomes
 - Indigenous women account for about 45% of the population but ¾ of maternal deaths
- Restrictive abortion law and practice

- Limited access to contraception and family planning services
 - 1 in 3 Indigenous women have no access to health and family planning services
- Gender-based violence and impunity
 - Sexual violence contributes directly to forced pregnancies and long-term physical and mental harms

GUATEMALA'S YOUTH

- Major challenges:
 - Early/forced marriage: Nearly 30% of Guatemalan girls are married or in a union before age 18
 - Early marriage often ends education prematurely, increases economic dependency, and raises risks of early pregnancy and maternal health complications
 - Adolescent pregnancy and reproductive health inequality: Guatemala has one of the highest adolescent fertility rats Latin America—around 68 births per 1,000 girls aged 15-19
 - **Educational barriers:** Girls are often expected to prioritize caregiving and domestic roles over schooling; Indigenous youth particularly disadvantaged: less than ½ complete primary school
 - Unequal economic opportunities: Gendered labor market participation
 - Silencing youth voices: young people—especially women and girls—face limited participation in decision-making about their own futures

"Sexuality itself is a big dimension of our lives. It's present from the time of our **births** until we pass away and **transition** to other lives. And in this country, the history of women and different communities, including youth and young males, is marked by a lot of sexual abuse.
